

DETERDING HONORED BY NAZIS AT FUNERAL

Oil Man Is Praised as Enemy of 'Bolshevism and Pan-Jewry'

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—Sir Henri Deterding, former head of the Royal Dutch Petroleum Company, was buried on his estate near here today. After a short service for members of the immediate family, a large official funeral ceremony was held, at which were present business leaders from all parts of Europe as well as representatives of The Netherlands and German Governments and officials of the National Socialist party.

Sir Henri was credited in the oration of Bishop Schultz of Schwerin with having fought bolshevism with the "boldness of a Napoleon and the will power of a Cromwell" and described as one who having opposed the "injustice of Versailles," saw in its reparation the salvation of the world from "pan-Jewry and bolshevism."

As the coffin was lowered into the grave, a deputy of the Fuehrer stepped forth and placing a wreath upon it said: "In the name of Adolf Hitler, I greet you, Henri Deterding, the great friend of the Germans." Field Marshal Goering sent a group of officers of the air corps to convey his respects.

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
